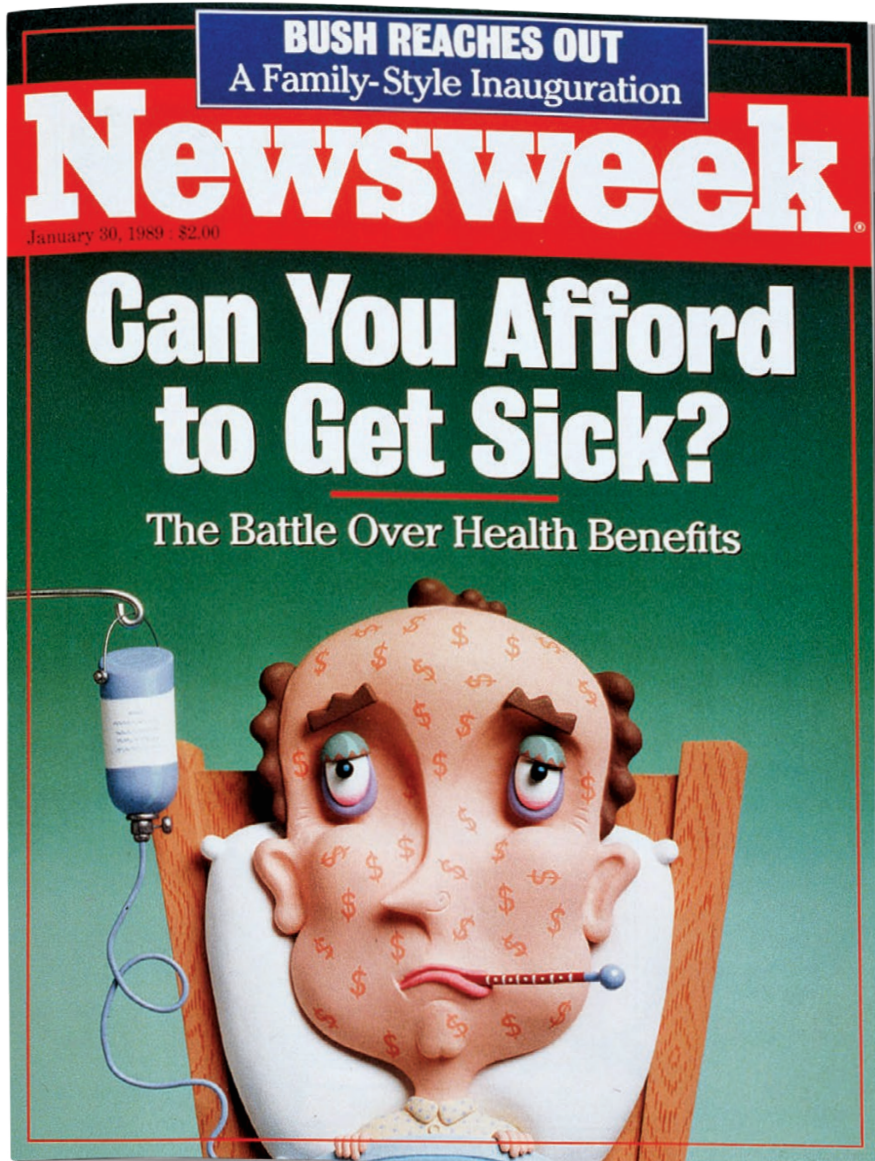

Sammie Harbour, a 27-year-old with sickle-cell anemia, was “forced to choose between a job he liked and doctors he trusted,” *Newsweek* wrote. He “quit and joined another company with a better health plan.” A 2022 Census report reveals that 54.5 percent of Americans rely on employment-based health insurance, while 27.6 million remain uninsured, as reported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Since the mid-1980s, insurance costs have surged by 740 percent, according to an analysis of the Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Expenditures Survey by Clover.

Author Truman Capote told *Newsweek*, “If you brought the art of the novelist together with the technique of journalism... it would have the most depth and impact.” Capote melded six years of research with his storytelling skills in his book, *In Cold Blood*, which ranked as the second-highest-selling true-crime book in U.S. history.

“The energy proposal would add \$250 a year to the \$900 the average household now spends directly on gasoline, heating oil, electricity and other fuels,” *Newsweek* wrote.
