

**1996** "The Ritalin riddle, a brain teaser for the '90s, confounds doctors, parents and, sometimes, children," *Newsweek* wrote, adding that "the stimulant can be a godsend for those who truly need it ... but for those who don't need it, Ritalin and its generic twins can be useless, or can even backfire." The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that more than 6 million children in the U.S. have ADHD, 62 percent of whom are prescribed medications like Ritalin. Since late 2022, there has been a nationwide shortage of such drugs due to increasing demand and federal limits on supply.





## 1976
